RESEARCH 101 AND BEYOND

# **TOPIC PROPOSAL SECTIONS**

### Section #1:

- Explain the general topic that you ideally wish to pursue and WHY it sincerely and legitimately merits attention.
- ▶ Explain the larger social significance of the topic. (See social significance criteria and the senior seminar project requirements.)

#### Section #2:

- Explain how your proposed topic has **traditionally or typically** been treated by **both MAINSTREAM MEDIA and ACADEMIC research.** You should address the standard approaches and answers which have been communicated in past research. What past research have you consulted? Attach a bibliography/works cited list.
- Describe what questions or issues have **NOT** been addressed or examined.
- ▶ Then describe what could (and should) be done to address those questions.

### Section #3:

- THEN, identify and explain the **7-10 questions** that you hope to explore and examine in detail with your proposed topic. **These should be presented as questions and then explained**.
- Describe what **interesting angles or approaches** could/should be applied to the exploration of the topic.

### Section #4:

- ▶ Describe the end product that you propose to complete: E~Book, Web Documentary, or Film Documentary. Describe why and how that particular medium would be effective for this topic; also describe your experience working in this medium.
- Describe whether you hope to be working individually or in a group. If working with a partner or in a group, identify the people you will be working with. Make sure that you've talked with them at length.
- Explain what **knowledge and skill sets each person would bring to the project**. (So, the knowledge and skills you bring if you are working independently, or what each person brings for a group project.)

# **RESEARCH 101:**

- ▶ GENUINE CURIOSITY about the topic, issues, people and trends associated with yo topic.
- ► IDEAL PEOPLE AND ORGANIZATIONS!!!
- ▶ START CONNECTING with people and organizations related to your topic.
- **▶ BIG PICTURE** perspectives
  - Cross-Disciplines AND Across Cultures
  - Across "interpretive communities"
- ► IMPORTANT TERMS/IDEAS, STATS, & QUOTES
- ► COOL/INTERESTING EXAMPLES of MEDIA THAT YOU'D LIKE TO EMULATE
- ► Things to AVOID and/or Be Aware of:
  - ▶ Your EGO and your **FEARS**.
  - **▶** Digital <u>Tunnel Vision</u> → information confirmation bias (filter bubbles).
  - ▶ Bi-polar (or "polarized") Thinking (Either/Or Complex)
  - ▶ Short-sighted Single-Sided-Answers to complex problems
  - ▶ The bias of Busine\$\$ and Technological imperatives



# Media FRAMES, Stereotypes, Skins… And CRAP DETECTION

✓FIND, READ, LISTEN TO, & SCREEN a WIDE range of media articles, essays, documentaries, blogs, podcasts, video clips, etc.

#### ☑ MAINSTREAM MEDIA REPRESENTATIONS—TYPICAL? REPEATEDLY?

- How is your topic TYPICALLY and REPEATEDLY presented/conveyed by mainstream media? (Think about visuals, concepts, headlines, people, events, etc.)
- What PATTERNS of representation appear to be utilized?
- WHO tends to get privileged, profiled, quoted or put on a pedestal?
- What aspects of your topic tend to get LEFT OUT and/or MARGINALIZED?
- How frequently is the topic examined or covered?

#### ✓ STORY FRAMES → STEREOTYPES → AGENDAS?

- What are the typical STORY FRAMES or ANGLES of APPROACH in addressing your topic?
- POLARIZATION? What are the ways in which the topic is POLARIZED or presented as an either/or set of issues?
- Who makes up the AGENDA SETTERS, knowledge monopolies or cultural POWER BROKERS associated with this topic? (Particular types of people, types of organizations, media producers, companies, governments, etc.)
- What are the TYPICAL and STEREOTYPICAL images, icons, headlines, or graphics which illustrate and/or frequently accompany any story associated with your topic?
- What types of QUOTES or STATISTICS are used to simplify or give meaning to issues related to the topic?





# Symbolic, Communicative, & MEDIA Perspectives

### 1. LANGUAGE

- What are the WORDS, terms, phrasings, and expressions are typically used to describe the topic and associated issues?
- Technical terminology???

#### 2. SYMBOLS and SYMBOL SYSTEMS?

- What types of major and minor symbols (or symbol systems) are used to communicate ideas about this topic?
- Graphic designs + Infographics
- Illustrations + Other imagery?

# 3. MEDIA TYPES & New Technologies → YouTube, IG, Tiktok, VR/AR

# 4. New Behaviors and/or Beliefs, Values, Priorities of living?

- What types of media devices are traditionally used to communicate ideas about the topic?
- How do new media change behavior related to this topic?

• How is the topic/subject part of a longer trend or set of patterns over time (decades, centuries,...)?

### 2.LANDMARK EVENTS?

• What landmark events or transitions are part of the larger "stories" related to the topic/issue?

## **3.CENTRAL FIGURES?**

• Who are the central figures associated with the evolution of the topic/issue?

# 4. Paradigm Shifts?

• New/different ways of thinking or approaching?
