Here's what is due for the critical and comparative research review. This is a crucial phase which will provide the foundation to your final proposal and your project next semester. In short, doing a **strong job on this** will set you up well for many other parts of the project.

CRITICAL RESEARCH REVIEW: Extended Annotations and Conclusions

- **A.** Standard Bibliographic Citation (Smith, Reginald. Why Children are Losing Basic Motor Skills in the Age of Screens. Harvard Press, 2025.)
- **B.** Descriptive summation of scope, themes, questions, and CENTRAL arguments of the work (article, book, other) using author's LAST NAME (According to Smith,...) as they <u>pertain directly or tangentially to your topic</u>.
- **C.** Evaluate the **qualitative** and **quantitative METHODS** and/or methodologies used in producing the work. Interviews? Archives? Analysis of media? Surveys?
- **D.** Comment on intended audience(s)
- **E.** Critical comparison of how the work compares to other works.
- **F.** Explain how this work and its conclusions inform, extend, or illuminate part of your project.
- **G.** What would you ask of the author(s)?

2. FRAMING ANALYSIS of TOPIC/ISSUES ACROSS POPULAR MEDIA FORMS/PLATFORMS

• Descriptions and analysis of important and commonly used narrative frames as well as the typical, stereotypical, archetypes, and patterns of representation.

3. CUSTOM RELEVANT TIMELINE

• Landmark Dates and Significant Events, Shifts, Trends, Changes...

4. GLOSSARY OF IMPORTANT TERMS, CONCEPTS, and DEFINITIONS

- Important technical terms, phrases, and operational definitions.
- Central to understanding the topic and its evolution but not widely known

5. DATA/STATS ANALYSIS

• Description and analysis of the significant data, data sets, statistics, or surveys conducted about your topic or the issues surrounding your topic.

6. CITATIONS, WORKS CITED, BIBLIOGRAPHY
