## **Untold Stories and Getting Beyond Mainstream Coverage**

## **DMC-DMK Senior Seminar**

Here's the assignment due at the beginning of class on Wednesday, Sept. 10th

The focus of this assignment is for you to track down and begin researching a minimum of <u>4 socially significant "UNtold stories"</u> or issues. These "untold" stories or issues should be of national or international importance, <u>BUT</u> for one reason or another, they have <u>not</u> been covered or communicated <u>effectively</u> (if at all). Perhaps they have been <u>overlooked</u>? Perhaps they have been <u>avoided</u> because of their complexity or emotional impact? Perhaps they don't see the light because an organization with <u>vested interests</u> wants them not to? Or perhaps they have tended to be <u>marginalized</u> or <u>under-reported</u>, or brushed aside in favor other obvious or sexy issues? In all cases, these untold stories should go beyond the mainstream.

In order to do this, you'll need to do THREE things:

First, you'll need to go to and peruse through the **South End Art Hop** either Friday, Saturday, or Sunday this weekend (Sept. 5-7). Look through the different exhibits and exhibitions with an eye toward interesting and important topics or issues which are brought out through people's art works, but which might not have been addressed much in mainstream media. Identify at least two which rise to the top. Identify the artist (or artists), take several photos (if allowed) and describe in one or two paragraphs what you think is **SIGNIFICANT** about the issues brought about by the works and how you might approach them as a senior seminar topic further aimed at national and international audiences as a doc film, web doc or E~book.

**Second**, read through the survey findings from the **PEW and GALLUP RESEARCH SITES**. See links below. Identify 4 different surveys (2 from each) which are particularly interesting to you. Read **between** the lines and think about the range of issues which might be behind such findings? Then assess the following for each:

- 1. Describe/Analyze what might be behind such findings or have catalyzed such trends. Be specific.
- 2. An analysis of WHAT the untold or underrepresented issue is and WHY it matters
- **3. WHY** is it of **national** or **international** significance?
- **4. HOW** does it tend to get stereotypically presented or covered when it is addressed (people, sources, perspectives, ideological stances, etc.)?
- **5. Project forward 5-10 years.** If the survey findings signal a trend which might continue to grow/evolve, then what additional issues are we likely to face in the future?
- **6. Senior Sem Project?** How could this be shaped into an interesting documentary (film/web) or e~book analysis in your eyes?
